Africans in Britain in the 1700s

Ignatius Sancho, first African man to vote in the 1700's. Olaudah Equiano, founder of the Sons of Africa and author of his life as an enslaved African. William Ansah, a Fanti Prince whose travels to the UK were not as he would have expected, leading his father to write a firm letter to the British government and having his son's journey set right.

Learn about the several images, literature and documented accounts of the melting pot we know of Britain today found in the 1500 - 1700s.




The Empire Needed Men

The Victoria Cross Medal (VC) is the highest and most prestigious decoration of the British Honours system. Awarded for valour 'in the presence of the enemy' to members of the British Armed Forces.

Black Leadership in the 1900's

Politics, Politics, Who should be in control of our voices?

- Marcus Moziah Garvey 1st West Indian man to establish an organisation that had members on five continents.
- Blaise Diagne 1st African man to be elected into the French Government.
- John Archer 1st Black Mayor of Battersea

We will outline a timeline that provides context to the occupation of Southern Africa and the similarities that can be found in North America, Asia and Oceania.



Anglo Ashanti Wars 1824 - 1901

This war saw three monarchs reign. King George IV, William IV and Queen Victoria.

Pictured to the left is King Prempeh I of the Ashanti Empire. He fought the British in the Fourth Anglo Ashanti War and was exiled to the Seychelles.

What happens to an Empire when it's leader is removed?

We can understand more about the Kings before and Yaa Asantewaa who led the final war against the British in 1900.



Italy & Ethiopia

The have been two wars between Italy and Ethiopia. Ethiopia being one of two of the only countries on the Continent of Africa never to have been colonialised.

Discover the historical battles from the:

1st Italo-Ethiopian War 1895 - 1896

Had the most famous 'Battle of Adwa' where Emperor Menelik II secured his nations victory.

2nd Italo-Ethiopian War 1935 - 1936

Italy had support locally from Italian Eritrea and Italian Somaliland and Italian Libya which support their victory and forces Haile Selassie into exile



The Herero/Nama War/Genocide

The division of Africa at The Berlin Conference 1884-85 saw Germany receiving regions within African that were not deemed economically viable. This led to conflict with the indigenous Kings & rulers.

It is recorded that up to 100,000 Herero lives were lost during this war/genocide between 1904 - 1908 in modern day Namibia.


This war ended in the same year as the atrocities in the Congo Free state where King Leopold II between 1885 - 1908 devastated the nation taking 10 - 15 million lives.

We unpack this and the effects that can still be felt today.

Indigenous American Wars

1609 - 1890 Wars between the: Spanish, Portuguese, British, French, Dutch and The Netherlands

- American Revolution (1775–1783)
- Cherokee-American wars (1776-1794
- War of 1812 (1811–1815)
- First Seminole War (1817–1818)
- Florida-Georgia Border War (1836)
- Second Seminole War (1835–1842)
- Third Seminole War (1855-1858)

When we look at North America, these wars are the foundation her occupation.

The Black Wars

1820 - 1832

The Black War triggered by the supplanting of British convicts, settlers and soldiers, and agricultural livestock throughout areas of Tasmania that had been traditional Aboriginal hunting grounds. From the late 1820s the Aboriginal people were also driven by hunger to plunder settlers' homes for food as their hunting grounds shrank, native game disappeared and the dangers of hunting on open ground grew.

We delve into this war had a devastating impact on the indigenous nations of Tasmania.

Maori Wars

1843 - 1872

We uncover the violence over land ownership that broke out first in the Wairau Valley in the South Island in June 1843. With rising tensions in Taranaki this led to the involvement of British military forces at Waitara in March 1860. The war between the government and Kīngitanga Māori spread to other areas of the North Island, with the biggest single campaign being the invasion of the Waikato in 1863–1864, before hostilities concluded with the pursuits of Riwha Tītokowaru in Taranaki (1868–1869) and Rangatira (chief) Te Kooti Arikirangi Te Turuki on the east coast (1868–1872).



World War I, 1914 - 1918

There is so much more to uncover as this historical global war continues to unpack so many more stories. King George V, Alhaji Grunshi, Norman Manley, Ratu Sukuna, Walter Tull, Dr. James Risien Russell were scholars, Doctors, Footballers, Chiefs, Teachers, and more. Each brought their character and abilities to fight for King & Country.

Do you know three of these men were studying in the UK before the war started? Two at Oxford university?

Come and learn their names and several others.



World War I saw Africans fighting on all sides of the War.

- King Mankong of Cameroon Germany
- Ibrahim Dinah Salifou France
- Marcel Pliat Russia
- Ali Celkten Ottomon Empire / Turkey

African men and women contributed to sevral war efforts over 400 years. We share their stories with you.



World War II, 1939 - 1945

King George VI just like his father relied on the Empire to answer the call again. (Despite the discrimination)

Men and women pictured to the left came from, Trinidad, Fiji, Jamaica, Liverpool - England, Barbados and Sierra Leone. One of these men led the return of RAF troop aboard the Empire Windrush in 1948.

Experience their stories and discover another side to this war.



Women @ War Globally : World War II

Did you know that women needed to speak, read and write English to be able to be considered to join and wear a uniform for service?

Women from, The West Indies, Indigenous Nations, India, England, USA with diverse heritages all did their parts to serve during World War II.

There are 8 women pictured to the left, you will be introduce to many more.





Since Europeans started trafficking African people all over the world there have always been rebellions and uprisings.

The Haitian Revolution led Haiti's independence in 1804 from France. The first and only country to liberate themselves within the West Indies. This cost the country heavily and we unpack the strategy and tactics executed by the leaders.

Women@ War Globally

Angola, Madagascar, Gold Coast (Ghana), USA, Jamaica, Ethiopia, Tasmania are the countries the women to the left come from.

Fighting is a human instinct especially when you are head of a community. Several of these women came from Royal households and held positions that would lead them to fight Europeans throughout time to protect their peoples, land and freedoms.

Women @ War Globally allows us to see how connected our histories really are and how easy it is to learn from each others choices.



African Americans and War

Robert Smalls, Harriet Tubman, Martin Delaney, Eugene Bullard, James Reece Europe, Henry Johnson, Olivia Hooker, Aileen Anita Cooks and Josephine Baker are the names of men and women who served in the American Civil War, World War I & World War II.

Their service, Impact and choices led to so many changes to laws, the arts, and freedom for African Americans all over America.

There is so much more to this history that we unpack together.



Music & War

Music exerts a powerful influence on human beings. It can boost memory, build task endurance, lighten your mood, reduce anxiety and depression, stave off fatigue, improve your response to pain, and help you work out more effectively.

Pictured to the left are soldiers from the No'2 Construction Battalion; an all Black Battalion formed in Nova Scotia, Canada in 1916.

Music was a key feature during war as EVERY army. We will share several military bands and their influence using sound.



Black & British History

Africans have been present in Britain since 43 AD.

We have been drawn in the Domesday Book in 1086, performed in the royal courts of Henry VIII in 1511, referenced in poems, characterised by William Shakespeare between 1590 - 1613 and documented as Moors, Negroes, Blackamoores and Africans in district records, headstone and newspaper articles.

We also fought and served in wars, created music, literature, film and art, were inventors, Doctors, Nurses, Lawyers and so much more.




Mary, Mary, Mary

The Berlin Conference & The Scramble for Africa

The Berlin Conference of 1884/85 allowed Europe to establish their official borders on the continent of Africa. The Xhosa Wars had come to an end in 1879 whilst Europe was still expanding their reach further into the continent and required this meeting to establish the rules of engagement with each other to develop efficient trade industries.

Africans became enslaved within Africa! We discuss this further.




Commonwealth & Empire

How did the commonwealth change Great Britain? How the resources, labour, evolution of the Industrial Revolutions alongside the Trafficking of Africans build and sustained the UK for centuries.

The English Language is spoken on three continents and facilitates most global meetings and interactions as the common universal language.

We trace the impacts of the commonwealth and Empire since the sixteenth century as we have always been together!





The West African Students Union & The League of Coloured People

Both groups were formed in England within the 1930's. during the time of the Great Depression in the UK.

Men coming from Africa and the West Indies for work and to gain access to further education were continuously met with racial oppression. The Colour Bar had been unregulated until the Race Relations Act of 1965 which was fought for and implemented to protect the rights of classified minorities within the UK.

In the same way The Sons of Africa did in the 1700s and fought for the end of the trafikking of Africans!

Windrush 75

We explore the legacies of the generations that came on and after the arrival of the Empire Windrush in 1948.

We are very aware that the Black Presence predates this arrival, however the impacts made by this highlighted generation is closer to our understanding of the Black Presence in the UK, leading to the changes in legislation, the NHS, The Transport System. Sports, Music, Food and the enhancement of UK culture, style and community.

Lord Learie Constantine - 1st Black Lord The Right Honourable Diane Abbott - 1st Black Woman MP (Labour)

Lord David Pitt - 1st Black Lord (Labour)

These are the names of the first. There have been many more that followed. Not to forget the names of Allan Glaisyer Minns and John Richard Archer who became the first Black Mayors in their respective districts back in the early 1900.

Having a voice in the place you call home is imperative and we discuss the significance of Black Politics in the UK.

Children Migration

Children of war, the children left behind, the children who were evacuated the children who were lost and lost their families, the children of mixed heritage discriminated against due their racial backgrounds, all have had very unique life changing impacts.

The psychological impact of these emotional events we break down and use history to gain a better understanding on the times and lives of children of migrants world-wide.






We diligently explore the global narratives of the men and women who served on all sides of European Wars. Exploring the areas of history that we currently learn through one lens.

Wars have been a major part of life as we know it. This has had a significant impact on Family, Culture, Identity and Migration.




We actively explore the global narratives throughout time.
